# **Recap of Minutes**

1) Karen Wood called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m.

- 2) Minutes of the November 14, 2022, meeting were approved as presented. M/S Kollenda/Schwerner.
- 3) Chair's Announcements: Karen Wood attended the puppet show performance by Luce Puppet Company on November 20, 2022.
- 4) Commissioner and Staff Communications: Michael Ervin complimented the Cultural Arts Department on decorating the Community tree at the Sawdust Art Festival's Winter Fantasy. Staff McGregor noted a well-attended performance by Luce Puppet Company on November 20, 2022. Staff Bichler noted the mural "Lovely Day" by Andy Davis at Bushard's Pharmacy would be dedicated on December 1, 2022, at 4:00 p.m. Staff Poeschl noted there were nine remaining performances at the Promenade on Forest in 2022 and there would be no performance on December 2, 2022, because of Hospitality Night. Staff noted meeting with artist Taylor Dean Harrison regarding the approved temporary sculpture installation at City Hall. Staff noted the Festival of Arts Permanent Collection was currently on exhibit at City Hall.
- 5) Public Communications: None.
- 6) Items for Discussion and Action:
- A) 2022 Children's Holiday Palette Exhibition Staff McGregor noted the Palette subcommittee and Youth Art Advisory Board had reviewed the 76 submissions for the exhibition and presented the recommendations. Staff noted the designs would be displayed at City Hall from December 1 to December 31, 2022, and the selected artists would be recognized at the City Council meeting on December 13, 2022. A motion was made to approve the selection of designs by Elle Walker, Arabella Gardner, Max Moratorio, Dylan Tian, Caroline Walden, Abigail Olin, Charley Jerabek, Sam O'Neill, Hannah Miller, Brighton Welch, Alice Mitsuha, and Bella Piskun, M/S Kollenda/Ervin. Yeas: Ballard, Ervin, Kollenda, Schwerner, Wood. Noes: None.
- B) <u>Alta Laguna Park Temporary Mural</u> Staff Bichler noted that staff had met with the Youth Art Advisory Board which recommended the temporary mural at Alta Laguna Park be undertaken by Laguna Beach High School students and presented the proposal by art instructor Jamie Kough to facilitate the project. Staff noted that the proposal included compensation for the participating youth artists and suggested funding options. Staff Poeschl

noted the project would need a Temporary Use Permit as well as budget approval or the acceptance of a donation to move forward. The Commission directed staff to return to Ms. Kough with the following parameter recommendations: 1) Limit age of participants to 14 years or older; 2) Expenses could not exceed \$10,000 in funding from the City; 3) Youth Art Advisory Board members could not be compensated; 4) The City would require a cost breakdown and expense report of the project.

# **MEMORANDUM**

SUBJECT: Kush Fine Art Gallery – Sculpture Donation Proposal

The Kush Fine Art Gallery has submitted a proposal to donate bronze sculptures by artist Vladimir Kush to the City of Laguna Beach's permanent public art collection. It is unclear from the proposal if the artist intends to donate two or seven sculptures all to be located in Hesiler Park. The sculptures vary in size with "Segway Seahorse" measuring 6' in height to "Shell" measuring 9" in height. These production pieces exist within the artist collection and are located in the gallery located on Forest Avenue.

In reviewing the application, the Arts Commission should take into consideration the following:

#### Site considerations:

1) The proposed "Segway Seahorse" is located below the World Wars Veteran's Memorial and the September 11 memorial sculpture. Annually, ceremonies are held at the site to honor those who lost their lives and is a site for quiet reflection. The proposed installation location is clearly visible from the memorials.





2) Staff requested input from the Public Works Department and the City's arborist noted the following regarding the location of the "Segway Seahorse":

"I am concerned that if the art piece requires any anchoring into the planter, this could damage the root inhiation zone of the palms. Once that happens it is an introduction for decay to enter into the trunk of these palms." 3) The location of the "Lyrical Impala" is on a narrow pathway leading from Main Beach to Heisler Park. There are three public art installations in close proximity to this site and would be clearly visible.





The location is clearly visible from the Inn at Laguna Beach and their pool area. Public Works provided the following input:

"The art pieces being proposed that are in the landscape planters might cause issues with the sprinkler coverage and irrigation and would be subject to water spotting and possibly discoloration from the salts, etc. in the water."

"The fireworks guy's setup mortars there (proposed location) for the  $4^{th}$  of July. This can damage the art and prevent this space to be used for the fireworks."

Shell, Sisyphus, Aries, Mystery of the Ocean, Where the World was Born







The application proposed the installation of five smaller sculptures on existing posts. These post caps are not level and include a stone at the center. To accommodate the sculpture, the post caps would all have to be removed and replaced to accommodate the sculptures. Public Works noted:

"The post caps have been known to be vandalized as well as come loose and therefore need to be resecured. They don't make a very good base for art. "



There are additional concerns that the Arts Commission should consider.

- 1) Permanent public arts sculptures are generally vetted through an open application process through a call for submissions or invitation. In bypassing this process and awarding permanent placement of artwork representing a specific gallery does not offer balanced programming for other galleries who might want to participate.
- 2) The public art collection is varied, seven sculpture in close proximity on publicly owned land by the same artist does not meet that desire.
- 3) The Arts Commission has approved a draft of the "Public Art Ordinance and Policies" which indicates:

Review Criteria for Artwork Donations or Loans

"#6 Uniqueness of Art: The City will accept only unique, one of a kind works of art apart from prints, photographs, or a desirable high-quality, limited-edition work of art by a renowned artist."

Staff researched the Vladimir Kush – Kush Fine Art website and watched the video of the foundry process and there was no information if these pieces are one of a kind or limited editions. The pieces are currently on display at the gallery.

4) Donations are accepted per the recommendation of the Arts Commission. Based on the new draft policy the Commission should consider the approved review criteria:

# Review Criteria for Artwork Donations or Loans

The Arts Commission shall evaluate proposed donations or loans and base its decision of acceptance or denial on the following criteria:

- 1. Aesthetic Considerations: To ensure artworks of the highest quality, proposed gifts or long-term loans of works of art should be accompanied by a detailed written proposal and concept drawings of the proposal, and/or photographs of an existing artwork, documentation of the artist's professional qualifications and, if needed, a current certified appraisal of the worth of the artwork. The Arts Commission shall assess the aesthetic value of the artist and the artwork to determine whether the donation or loan should be accepted and may refuse the proposed donation or loan on aesthetic grounds.
- 2. Site Context: If the donor is proposing a site for the donated or loaned artwork, the artwork must be compatible in scale, material, form, and content with its proposed site. Attention shall be given to the social context of the work and the way it may interact with or contribute to the use of the site. Significant consideration shall be given to the structural and surface soundness, and to the possibility of and resistance to theft, vandalism, weathering, and excessive maintenance or repair costs.
- 3. Financial Considerations: Funding for the project, and the estimated cost of maintenance and repair over the expected timeframe of the artwork. If the proposed donation or loan is accepted, a legal instrument of conveyance of the work of art should be executed between the City and the donor. Acceptance is contingent on receipt of payment from the owner for all costs associated with the gift, including transportation, installation, and maintenance endowment and staff time.
- 4. Liability: Susceptibility of the artwork to damage and vandalism, any potential danger to the public, and any special insurance requirements.
- 5. Maintenance: The City shall require that the donor provide an endowment for the long-term maintenance and conservation of the donated and loaned artwork, except where there are alternative funding sources for these expenses or there is a compelling reason for the City to accept financial responsibility.
- 6. Uniqueness of Art: The City will accept only unique, one of a kind works of art apart from prints, photographs, or a desirable high-quality, limited edition work of art by a renowned artist.

The public art sub-committee consisting of Donna Ballard, Suzi Chauvel and Adam Schwerner met to discuss the proposal and the issues noted in this report. The Committee dose not support or recommend accepting sculptures by Vladimir Kush to the City's collection, either permanently or temporarily. This is the second application by the artist, the committee recommends denial of the application and that any future proposal be reviewed by the committee to determine the level of interest, prior to utilizing staff resources to prepare the report.

As you mentioned, our previous application was never brought back to the table even though, several board members were ready to vote "Yes" on the day of the meeting, and before the meeting ended, we discussed having a Fire Marshall come to the location to makes sure there were no issues with the fire hydrant, also considering the Wave sculpture is already next to it currently.

We only request that you give us the opportunity to present and discuss this project with the Commission. We would also like to extend an invitation to the Commission if they would like to have this meeting in our Gallery, as our doors are always open, and it would be a pleasure to host everyone.

# Segway Seahorse by Vladimir Kush

No doubt you are seeing the new species of fauna, created by the artist's imagination. The new artifact belongs to both elements: Ocean and Earth. The head and the shape of the neck of the seahorse resemble the chess horse. It is covered with the spikes and shields just as an armory is covering the head of the knight horse. As a seahorse, the creature could be moving up and down under the water, but the wheel allows him to roll in a horizontal direction. As magic, he rolls out of the sea and turns into the circus performer. The silence of the ocean is changed to the earthly sounds of applauding! Before he swam slowly around the corals and hooked up his tail to the seaweed, now he is involved in the hectic downtown life.

The headlight allows him to find its way through the streets at night. The fin behind resembles the wing of the horse with wings- the Pegasus, beloved by the Muse.


His name meaning as "turbulent sea" comes from his birthplace at the origin of the sea



Since Laguna Beach symbolizes the connection of the Ocean and the Land, the Artist believes that the Segway Seahorse reflects the connection between the two elements: the Earth and the Ocean. Being installed at the heart of Laguna Beach town, the connection to arts and music is apparent through the symbolism of the Pegasus, the winged horse.

# Lyrical Impala by Vladimir Kush

This type of antelope is known by its grace. Its homs are reaching 45-90 cm with a shape that resembles the Lyra (a Greek musical instrument). Only males are the proud owners of them. In the Bible we can find multiple mentions that the Lyra was popular in ancient Egypt. The Lyra was one of the favorite instruments for the ancient Jewish people. King David enjoyed playing it.


A "lyrical moment" can be seen in the earlier bronze sculpture by Vladimir Kush titled "Flamenco Dancer" Bronze Sculpture. The Dancer is holding her arms in the air shaped as a Lyra.

In Greek tradition, a lyre made from antelope horns was the instrument of Apollo, the god of prophecy and music. Playing it, Orpheus tamed wild animals, and charmed trees and mountains. According to Hindu doctrine, when Krishna played the flute, the cosmos started to move, and creation of the world began.

Bronze Sculpture, Size: 9" x 24" x 9"



The light of a pearl radiates from the belly of the conch shell lying on the shore. A few other conch shells, according to ancient belief, soaked up the energy of the sun and ascended to the sky. When night falls and the skyward shells shed their cases, pearl beads will be strewn all over distant celestial fields and shine with a distant luster. Angels will swoop up the empty conchs and blow them like horns, singing the glory of the Lord.

The sea and water are the main sources of life, symbols of transformation, purification, and resurrection. Like the growth rings of a tree, the spiral shape of the shell's case is symbolic of time, with its cycles of the year and phases of the moon.

Yin and yang is a form of spiral, too. Here each half carries a grain of another, characterizing the interdependence and harmony of both.

# "Sisyphus"

Bronze Sculpture. Size: 14" x 14" x 8"



The Greeks believed that there was no punishment worse than fruitless labor; thus, the Gods sentenced Sisyphus to an eternity of hopeless toil, forcing him to push a huge stone up a mountain, down which it would inevitably roll.


In his famous essay, philosopher Albert Camus interprets the myth of Sisyphus as the logic of absurdity for the millions of working people.

In this piece, the artist renders his poetic interpretation of Sisyphus at work. It can be called poetic, given how the remarkable Russian poet Vladimir Mayakovsky described the task: "Shine always, shine everywhere, that's the motto of me and the Sun!"

The beetle working every day, rolling the Sunup the mountain - to "shine everywhere" - is an optimistic interpretation of this well-known myth. The ascending and descending of the glowing orb resemble the cyclic movement of the celestial bodies in the sky: the cyclical movement of the sun and disappearance of the moon below the Earth's surface.


Bronze Sculpture, Size: 28" x 18" x 10"



One lonely evening, the sheep left the stable and went to the seashore to see the sunset. "The sunset is so magnificent, but he never teases," the sheep realized. "Maybe, he will want to become my friend." But as Aries arrived at the seashore, the sunset dipped quickly behind the horizon in the direction where there seems to be a hole in the sea.

# "Mystery of the Ocean"

Bronze Sculpture, Size: 12" x 12" x 12"



The bottom of seas and oceans conceals a multitude of secrets of fabulous treasures, lost with sunken ships. It's hard to imagine how many antique Spanish galleons, transporting gold treasures of the New World, sank on their way home.

The ocean has always been a source of inspiration for artists and writers. There is, one knows not what sweet mystery about this sea, whose gently awful stirrings seem to speak of some hidden soul beneath... all that we call lives and souls, lie dreaming, dreaming, still; tossing like slumberers in their beds; the ever-rolling waves but made so by their restlessness. Herman Melville, Moby Dick, Chapter 111, "The Pacific"

# "Where the World is Born"

Bronze Sculpture, Size: 9" x 12.5" x 12"



- The ancient Chinese model of the universe was centered on a giant sea turtle who carried the earth on its back.
- As based on the tortoise, the shell was a dome that represented the canopy of heaven, and its belly represented the earth floating on water.

It is noteworthy that until the beginning of the 20th Century, it had not occurred to anyone that the universe could expand or shrink. Everyone thought that either the universe always existed as is, or that it was created at some point in the past and remains unchanged ever since. The upper part of the painting reminds us of the universe being created by the Big Bang and then keeping static (See Sunset by the Ocean by the artist). The turtle carrying the world on its back reflects the human inclination to believe in the ultimate truths, in the permanence of the once created universe. The deliberation of the turtle makes it a symbol of constancy.

#### Overview

During the 2020 Pandemic, the Arts Commission and Cultural Arts Department, with funding from the Wayne Peterson Trust through the Laguna Beach Community Foundation, created a grant program titled "Fostering Creativity in a Time of Crisis." Laguna Beach artist Margaret Hemsley submitted her design proposal and was awarded a grant of \$4,000.

Margaret Hemsley is proposing to fulfill her display requirement for her grant with a temporary installation at the pocket park on Laguna Frontage Road near Woodland Drive. This location is a community gathering space located opposite Thurston Trailer Park and is a highly visible to visitors during the summer festival season. The site is currently under construction and estimated to be completed by June, 2023. The pocket park will return to its pre construction condition with the site measuring approximately 24' in width by 60' in length. The tempoaray sculpture will be on exhibit from June 15, 2023, to September 15, 2023.

Ms. Hemsley is a mixed media artist who works in reclaimed vintage pottery and ceramics. Her sculpture "SIT" is a slight deviation from the original proposal but usues the same materials and application. The installations encourages the passerby to "SIT", on the nearby benches and take in the beauty of the hills and the wildlife of the canyon. The design is included as Exhibit B with the base and the lettering fully enclosed.

#### Recommendation

Staff recommends approval of a temporary sculpture installation in the pocket park at the end of Laguna Frontage Road by Margaret Hemsley from June 15, 2023, to September 15, 2023, to fulfill the art installation grant requirements of the "Fostering Creativity in a Time of Crisis" program.

#### PUBLIC ART




